Downshifting Tony Heinen Member No 1461

Tony Heinen grew up in suburban Sheboygan County Wisconsin. He along with parents and two sisters spent their formative years on a working farm near the town of Oostburg. Tony says that although there's not much to see what you hear makes up for it. In 1979 he met and married the "new girl next door" and together he and Jean raised four children who "...turned out to be good productive people and we are so proud of each of them." At present, they have "three grandchildren...so far!"

Tony's interest in cars was born of necessity. "It became necessary for me to find affordable alternatives for car repairs, because my early driving habits were very hard on auto parts."

His parents sponsored a vocational training course in auto mechanics at the local tech school which launched a career in auto repair at the GM dealership. A few years later he became a co-owner of an independent auto dealership which lasted 43 years. "After 43 years in the auto business I can say that I've been blessed by having a career doing something that I enjoyed in a community of honorable people, with a team of trusted employees.

Tony's first car was a 66 Chrysler Newport two-door hardtop that was powered by a big 383 V8 with a two barrel carburator. That baby 2 barrel was soon a 4 barrel holly, of course, along with exhaust cut-outs. That car was the most fun for a high schol student's shenanigans...it had a BIG trunk!!!"

Everybody has a story of the one that "got away". For Tony it was a 1969 Mustang Mach1, 428 Cobra Jet with a 4 speed. "that car was a hoot! Nobody needs that much power in a pony car. It was the fastest car I've ever driven and I am glad I survived. It's a six figure car today".

After spending 64 winters in Wisconsin, Jean said, "I will never spend another winter in Wisconsin". So down they came to sun City West. However, they did not come alone. It was Tony, Jean and their magnificent Turquoise 1957 Chevy Bel Air!

The first time it entered the ARC shop, it literally stopped traffic! There was just something about "this one" that seemed spepcial. As we came to discover, not only is it a beautiful car but it has a beautiful story, a story about love!

"My 57 Bel Air has been quite a journey. The first time I saw it for sale, I passed on it because it was too far gone. Then two weeks later for our 25th anniversary, Jean gave me the keys!"

So began the six year (on and off again) project of restoring this old Chevy. Their three teenage sons were all at home when this restoration began and it was a great opportunity for a shared family experience and for them to learn about cars. The first order of busines was to remove the body from the frame, throw the frame away and replace it with a "Southern frame" with no rust. Next came the rolling chassis followed by a 400 HP small block Chevy engine, 4 speed Muncie gear box, 9 inch Ford power rack and pinion steering, four wheel disc brakes and basic safe upgrades. The notoriously rusted floors, quarter panels and rocker panels were replaced. Fortunately, they were all easily obtainable replacement parts made available by a team of trusted employees."

"The car was always built to be a driver, and it has become a trusted ride. The best part of being out with the car are the people who walk up and tell me about the memories it stirs up. "My dad, my uncle, my grandpa, someone had a car like this one."

The Bel Air has gone on seven fundraising road rallies, three daily and two overnight events. All of these events were sponsored by Crown Rally out of Minnesota. A maximum of one hundred entries per event, previous entrants get the first opportunity to repeat. Our favorite rally was the "Wounded Warrior Project".

Tony says that, "ARC is a very important part of this community". The activities, social events, shows, fundraisers, all add to the quality of life here for residents to enjoy. The shop is a great place to go to meet and just hang out or lend a hand, grab a coffee or cookie. If you're a "car guy", you couldn't find a nicer "toy box" to go to. Thanks so much to all the people who give their time to keep it going!"







It's hard not to run into some news about electric vehicles (EV's) these days and all of the clean air they will create. Unfortunately, to make the electricity needed to run EV's, most current power plants have to burn fossil fuels to generate the total amount of electricity needed for charging.

The electrification of automobiles

You have to respect Toyota for telling it like it is! This should bring a lot of the "dreamers" that want to eliminate internal combustion engines back to reality.

Depending on how and when you count, Japan's Toyota is the world's largest automaker. According to 'Wheels,' Toyota and Volkswagen vie for the title of the world's largest, with each taking the crown from the other as the market moves. That's including Volkswagen's inherent advantage of sporting 12 brands versus Toyota's four. Audi, Lamborghini, Porsche, Bugatti, and Bentley are included in the Volkswagen brand family.

GM, America's largest automaker, is about half of Toyota's size thanks to its 2009 bankruptcy and restructuring. Toyota is actually a major car manufacturer in the United States. In 2016 it made about 81% of the cars it sold in the U.S. right here in its half a dozen American plants. If you're driving a Tundra, RAV4, Camry, or Corolla it was probably American-made in a red state. Toyota was among the first to introduce gas-electric hybrid cars into the market with the Prius twenty years ago. It hasn't been afraid to change the car game.

All of this is to point out that Toyota understands both the car market and the infrastructure that supports it perhaps better than any other manufacturer on the planet. It hasn't grown its footprint through acquisitions as Volkswagen has, and it hasn't undergone bankruptcy and bailout as GM has. Toyota has grown by building reliable cars for decades.

When Toyota offers an opinion on the car market, it's probably worth listening to. This week, Toyota reiterated an opinion it has offered before. That opinion is straightforward:

"The world is not yet ready to support a fully electric auto fleet."

Toyota's head of energy and environmental research, Robert Wimmer, testified before the U.S. Senate and said: "If we are to make dramatic progress in electrification, it will require overcoming tremendous challenges, including refueling infrastructure, battery availability, consumer acceptance, and affordability."

Wimmer's remarks come on the heels of GM's announcement that it will phase out all gas internal combustion engines (ICE) by 2035. Other manufacturers, including Mini, have followed suit with similar announcements.

Assistant Fire Marshall John Tiexiera shows member Linda Victor latest improvements in AED



A SNOWBIRD'S WORST NIGHTMARE By Dan Kuhl

A snowbird is defined as a northerner who moves to a warmer southern state in the winter. When is a snowbird no longer a snowbird? I have lived in the southwest for 45 years and consider myself no longer a snowbird, but can still remember the things that make living in the winter north a real nightmare.

I left Minnesota Memorial Day weekend 1975, driving a 1969 Ford pickup with overdrive, not a Studebaker. On the second day I left Denver in a snow storm for the last leg of my trip. No problem, I knew it was something I could handle. By the time I hit the Raton Pass the storm had morphed into a blizzard. The snow came down so hard and the wind drifts on the freeway caused the snow to pack around the engine so badly that the engine almost died before dropping into the warmer climes of New Mexico where I found a hot bowl of chili in Santa Fe. Thank God I was used to driving in the heavy Minnesota snow storms.

So what is this nightmare? It's not snow; it is bitter cold temperatures that keep you from starting your car. Read on and you may remember some of these remedies that were the talk of town every time one of those Canadian cold snaps blew in from the north.

It was bad enough having to leave a warm bed in the dead of winter, but having to go out and try to get that miserable car started was the worst thing ever! Some folks would try heating the intake manifold while others would drain the radiator and replace the fluid with heated water. If you were really brave, you might try a tray of burning charcoal under the engine block.

In high school I drove a Model A. To ensure it started in the morning, my Dad convinced me to take the battery to bed with me. So every night it came into the house with me and I never missed a day of school. Most popular at this time were tank heaters and dip stick heaters that kept the antifreeze and oil warm respectively. These and a can of Heet in the gas tank kept most cars starting all winter long.

Most college kids started their education living in a dorm. A car wasn't needed. It didn't matter if your car was frozen in the nearest parking lot and literally covered in ice, preventing access to the inside or jumping the battery. And besides, the liquor stores were within walking distance. We all looked forward to the spring thaw so we could go to keg parties at the granite quarry or go necking down by the Mississippi River. On campus were a series of tunnels that permitted students to attend class in shirt sleeves, and visit the commissary or a girl's dorm as needed.

Things really changed when my friends and I moved off campus. We had to find a way to get our cars started or miss class. It helped if you could schedule your classes on the same day, or help each other out in getting the cars started. One day we decided to draw straws as to who would be responsible to get up and start all of the cars every couple hours in the middle of the night. This worked well as long as the designee did his job. One night one of the guys failed to do his job. The next morning the only car that started was a '67 VW Beetle. The problem was that the day before it was parked in reverse, and because it was so stiff it could not be moved into a forward gear. We knew we had to get to class, so we piled into that VW and rode to school in reverse.

The best way to eliminate this nightmare is a heated garage or a move to the sunbelt. I chose the latter. Now, all I worry about is the desert heat, which can be a nightmare in its own right.


Welcome to "In For Repairs"!


