

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Downshifting Jim Gallagher (#412) Does it Again! by Ed Zacko

Jim Gallagher is no stranger to ARC. We met Jim some ten years back when he began the resurrection of a blue 1966 Stingray he had obtained as a burned out hulk. It was one of the first long term projects that inaugurated the newly opened ARC facility. We don't usually feature someone twice but this case is rather unique and celebratory.

In September, with little fanfare, Jim's latest restoration roared to life.

This time it was a 1965, Marina Blue Corvette Stingray. "I especially like the 65," says Jim. "It was the first Corvette to have four wheel disc brakes and also a 450 HP engine. That makes this year so unique."

A Corvette is not at all unusual around ARC. Many members have one and some of them have been lovingly restored. What makes Jim's case so unique and remarkable is that this latest one marks his twenty-eighth Corvette restoration. As one who is struggling through only a partial restoration of only one Corvette, the idea of restoring twenty-eight of them is awe inspiring! But, what's more interesting and indeed heartening about this project was the speed at which it was completed.

Every car enthusiast dreams of restoring the favorite car of their dreams. This one, like countless others, had been sitting, gradually deteriorating, in someone's garage for decades either waiting for the latest dreamer to begin or perhaps for the next one to come along after the current owner simply gave up. These are known as "barn finds." They are out there in many forms just waiting for the next Jim Gallagher to come along. The car arrived at ARC literally in pieces. There were boxes of parts that had to be sorted and catalogued just to see if there was indeed a complete car there.

Jim wasted absolutely no time procrastinating. The body was immediately removed from the frame and taken into the paint shop for preparation. The engine was disassembled and taken to a machine shop to be prepared for rebuilding and the frame was completely stripped and sent out to be media blasted and powder coated.

While waiting for the frame and engine, the body was prepped for painting. The newly painted frame returned and without fail, every single day, Jim and his close friend Karl Webber could be found either on, in, or under what was quickly on the way to becoming a car as they worked to install the suspension, exhaust pipes, mufflers and brake lines. The engine parts, back from machining, were ready for Jim and Craig to assemble and install onto the frame. The impeccably painted body was finally lowered and set back onto the frame. Finally, the real work of running an all new electrical system began.

The car finally completed is a true work of art. The engine and transmission are the original that came with the car and have been completely rebuilt, the engine balanced, bored and ported. All numbers are matching and the body sound and unmolested, exactly the way it came from the factory.

Most restorations take years. Many can take decades. Sadly, some are never completed despite multiple owners. The project, from the day it arrived at ARC until that first roar of the engine, was completed in an astonishing six months! To the outside observer, they made it look easy. It all "appeared" to be one smooth, coordinated effort.

Jim said, "My first restoration seemed to go on forever. I've got a good 600 hours into this one and perhaps more but I never would have been able to do this so well and so quickly without the ARC facility we have here. It made all the difference."

Whenever we take our "vintage Vettes" out on the road there is always that same question, "Is it for sale? Name your price!" So I had to ask. "Well?"

"Never! I'll never sell this car!" was Jim's reply.

YOU'LL LOVE THAT FOUR-DOOR by Dan Kuhl

Recently an Auto Restoration Club member, Tony Giralano, brought a 1954 Pontiac Chieftain four-door into the shop to breathe some life back into its flathead straight-8 engine after sitting in the California desert for umpteen years. He is a confirmed hot rodder who has never owned a car from the 50's nor a four-door sedan. His Pontiac is definitely a horse of a different color. On the other hand, I have owned several four-door collector cars over the past 38 years. Thank you Tony for giving me the impetus to enlighten the Club on the merits of owning these wonderful old cars that are too often overlooked by a car-hobby enthusiast.

We need to preserve the four-door sedan which came as a station wagon or hardtop as well, because these workhorses are intrinsically linked to our nation's history as are Victorian homes and turn of the century mills. These are the cars that sold in greatest numbers, as noted in the latest issue of *Turning Wheels*, a publication of the Studebaker Drivers Club, and carried the American family to work, school, church, and across the country on Route 66.

From the hobbyist's point of view these cars have many desirable characteristics. A four-door sedan was affordable when it was new and is affordable today when compared to the two-door hardtop and convertible. The balance sheet looks like this: the owner gets 50% more doors for about 50% less money. This makes pretty good sense, especially if you are trying to break into the collector car hobby.

The extra doors can be doubly important if you are transporting kids, grandparents, pets, or if you decide to take friends out for dinner and show off your ride. And, remember there is typically more room in a four-door model, especially a station wagon.

Practicality set aside, what would make an antique car junkie happy? In a nutshell, the ride. We buy these cars to drive and reminisce about the good old days. Once you've made the decision to buy a four-door you will notice the front and back ends are the same as a hardtop as are the following: the same engine and drive-train, the same interior and instrument panel, and the same view out the windshield.

When all is said and done, affordability is the key factor. You get your ride at a reasonable price, save a part of history, and have fun doing it. When it comes time to sell it you will not make a killing, but guess what, you didn't pay a ton for it either. Such is the story with my '40 Ford that I recently purchased and my '53

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Buick, purchased in 2015. My first four-door, purchased in 1984, was a '63 Studebaker Daytona Wagonaire with the sliding top. All three are uniquely nostalgic with great histories, and get their share of attention at car shows. But most important, the two that I own currently are a thrill to drive.


Solstice Senior Living Car Show






