Deuce Coupe Corner by Tom Jones, President





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Downshifting Ray Petersen #68 by Ed Zacko

Back in 2019, BC (before Covid), Rusty Nuts featured Ray Petersen, an ARC member "who had a dream that he didn't know he had!" We don't usually do a double take on someone but this is a special case. When that piece was written, Ray was deep in the throes of giving birth to his newfound dream, a 1937 Cord replica. Now as 2023 draws to a close the car has been completed (are they ever?) and has been on the road for some time. It seems fitting to give members an update on Ray and the Cord.

Ray grew up in Taylor Falls, MN. He joined the Marines right out of high school, and served three years at various bases in the United States and one year in Okinawa. After being discharged, he went to work for Northwestern Bell as a lineman making \$2.00 an hour climbing poles. After 31 years he retired but continued doing training for a few years which took him to Indonesia for a year.

Ray's history with cars began with a 1952 Chevy Super Deluxe that he managed to wreck in his senior year of high school. He moved on to a '64 Buick Riviera with a huge 425 engine, and then a '68 Chevy Impala 348 convertible. "All of them huge "boats" that I drove from gas station to gas station."

Ray and his wife Merilee arrived in SCW in 2002. He spent most of his time in the Wood Club, eventually serving as president of that club for several years. Nowhere in Ray's history was there anything remotely resembling auto mechanics or building, tinkering with, racing, or dreaming about cars. "I didn't work on them, I simply drove them."

That all changed one morning while Ray was happily sitting at the doughnut table. Tom Jones sat down and said, "Have I got a deal for you!" Ray bought the '37 Cord, Craig Landers talked him into restoring it and correcting its problems, and he went to work.

Ray's lineman skills surfaced when he discovered the need to rewire the entire car but other than that, it was all, "Mostly elbow grease and learn as you go, under the direction and aid of the more experienced members.

It was a lot of work, but it turned out pretty cool."

To say that Ray's interest in cars began when he joined ARC is only partially correct. You see, Ray didn't merely join ARC, he is actually one of ARCs founding members, #65 of what we refer to as "ARC's Magnificent 75." These were the first 75 people to sign on, satisfying the RCSCW's 75-signature requirement for starting a club. Thirteen years later, he is completing his third year as second vice president of ARC in charge of training.

Ray's story is but one example of ARC in action. You don't have to be an engineer, mechanic or "gear head" to belong to ARC. All you really need is the desire to learn and participate, which is what a club is all about. Just beware of that doughnut table!







Meeting Molly by Mike Bell



Verda and I had a wonderful time visiting and making friends with David and Karen Witton. They are an English couple who shipped their 1930 Austin 7 (the father to our American Austin), from the UK to NYC, where they drove down Broadway and around downtown NYC. Then on to Chicago, where they drove on the Dan Ryan Expressway and Lake Shore Drive. After that they were off to follow Route 66 as much as possible. Old Route 66 basically follows I-55 from Chicago to St. Louis, then I-44 to Oklahoma City. We met up with them at the Flagstaff, AZ Amtrak station and gave each of them an ARC cap. Then we followed them the 33 miles to Williams, AZ on I-40. Four-way flashers were on the whole time at a top speed of 40 mph. There we had a wonderful late lunch with them.

It is customary in England to name their Austins. Molly is the one they brought over and is the one they've had the longest. David had the engine and suspension completely overhauled and installed new tires to get everything ready to go for the trip. The only mechanical problem they encountered along the way was a flat tire in St. Louis, MO. They own 12 Austin 7's and all are named starting with the letter "M". Karen's' A7 is Matilda.

Since Route 66 is no longer considered an official highway, some parts are in great shape; some are in disrepair, are not in existence anymore, or are part of the Interstate system. They tried to keep off the Interstate as much as they could, but sometimes it's not possible

While staying in Winslow, AZ, David videotaped Karen driving down Main Street as he sang: "Sitting on the corner in Winslow, AZ, such a fine sight to see. There's a girl my heaven in an Austin 7 slowing down to take a look at me." A slight modification from the Eagles version.

They have American and British flags on their car as they travel. The American flag flew off the stick on the way to Williams. Not to worry though, they had about a half dozen more on hand for such an event. They took a day off driving to relax and ride the daily Grand Canyon Express train from Williams to the Canyon. Then on to Las Vegas to drive Molly down the Vegas strip and visit friends. After that they were on their way to Los Angeles and Santa Monica, CA with a few more side trips along the way. In Los Angeles, David and Karen will spend time with friends and then ship "Molly" back to the UK.

"It was well worth the time to drive from Sun City West to Flagstaff and Williams, AZ. We had several common friends from the Isle of Wight Austin Club we belong to and some of the other English Austin Clubs we have visited." David and Karen were at the Austin Centennial Celebration last year where they met several Americans who belong to the AABC and ABS (the two American Austin/Bantam Clubs). "We have met many English Austin owners in our travels and found them all to be extremely friendly, a delight to be around, and all proud of their vehicles."

They started their trip from NYC on September 13 and finished in Santa Monica November 2. It took 160 hours of driving time to travel 4,355.6 miles, with lots of truckers and cars honking and waving as they passed them by. Molly is ready for her journey home. She's at the Long Beach, CA shipping docks to go back to the UK. I wonder, how many of us Yanks would be willing to drive our Classic Cars on a trip like this?

For a 93-year-old, Molly has traveled a lot. Other places they've driven Molly to, according to the stickers on their windshield, have been Kirchberg, Austria; leper (with a capital "I") Belgium (also known as Ypres in the French language); the Normandy, France, 70th Anniversary; Amboise, France; and Pegasus, France.

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"E" IS FOR EXCELLENCE AND EDUCATION ON THE RADIO By Dan Kuhl

Studebaker is very famous for their saying, "Always Give a Little More Than You Promise." Nothing demonstrates this more than the award they won in support of their WWII efforts. Studebaker was given the coveted Army-Navy "E" award for excellence in meeting production and quality goals. (Note: there was no separate Air Force until 1947.)

Their participation started before the US entered the war after Pearl Harbor. In the late 30's Studebaker was already supplying K-Series trucks to European countries who were preparing to battle the onslaught of Nazism. These "Army Trucks", as they were affectionally called, were so popular that Stalin copied them in the factories of Russia. With the new Champion automobile, they brought the most profit to the Studebaker corporation since 1929. The importance of this truck is also exemplified in its use in completing a major homeland security project, the building of the Alaskan Highway.

The list of contributions to the war effort goes on. Studebaker's Weasel is famous for its ability to take soldiers into inaccessible war zones because of its tracked propulsion, and later for its use in amphibious situation and, of course, its reliable Champion engine.

In the late 20's Studebaker built a test track west of South Bend. It was the first of its kind in all of automotive manufacturing. This track, with "Studebaker" spelled out using large pine trees that could be seen when flying overhead, was made available to all of the corporations developing vehicles for the war effort. Studebaker also assembled the Lockheed PV-1 medium twin engine bomber that the Navy used to menace Hitler's U-boat fleet.

The Studebaker war project that garnishes the most notoriety was the Wright Cyclone R-1820 aircraft engine, which powered the B-17 Flying Fortress. The Cyclone engine was introduced in 1931. Constantly upgraded, it possessed 575 horsepower in 1820 cubic inches.

In 1942 Studebaker issued a radio listener's atlas that sold for 10 cents. In the back of the atlas was an ad for the Cyclone engine previously mentioned, and in the front was this statement: "The Roadways of the World are Worn Deep with Studebaker Wheel Marks." Many companies issued these atlases to help families follow the war effort on the radio and locate where family members were stationed during the war. Your author recently watched a 1949 movie, *The Big Wheel*, starring Mickey Rooney. Mickey plays a race car driver whose mother invites a friend into her home parlor to listen to the radio - no TV yet! Besides making me think about the importance of the radio in 1949, the lack of seatbelts and race car drivers driving in street clothes caught my attention. There were at least four racing accidents in the movie showing how the drivers escaped the race car after the crash, and one where the driver was trapped and burned in the crash. They believed until 1956 that cars were safer without seat

belts/harness so the driver could escape the too-often fiery crashes. In 1956 Ray Crawford walked away from a head-on Indianapolis 500 crash after wearing a seat belt/harness (Note: Studebaker made seat belts available in the their vehicles in 1956). This incident changed the no-seat belt standard. It should also be noted that racing suits were not used until the late 50's and these suits did not contain a fire retardant until the mid 60's. In closing, if you are thinking of watching this movie there are many old cars of the 40's and great historical photos of the Brick-yard to enjoy.

Notes: The Indiana Historical Society indicated that there was no crash fire suppression equipment available in 1949. There was a first aid station however. The track and the museum at the Indianapolis 500 facility were also contacted. Neither knew of any fire fighting equipment in 1949. References:

Reminder to volunteer and join in the fun! ARC Car Show Judging To Go Casual in 2024

At a recent meeting of the 2024 ARC Car Show committee, the procedure of judging the entrants was discussed, with the goal of simplification. Ideas for making the process more efficient and easier for our judges, yet maintaining fairness for the entrants, were the basis for analysis and suggestions.

Previous shows provided a scoring sheet of four categories with points in each to be awarded by judges, the class winner being the high scorer. The system was thought a bit complicated, perhaps confusing, and time consuming.

So, for the upcoming show, ARC will try a simple "What do you like best" approach. Judges won't need to calculate points for each vehicle. They'll just select the three cars that were the most appealing to them......no pre-established criteria or guessing how many points it ought to have......just pick their #1, #2, and #3 in the class. Teams might think, "Of all I've looked at, I'd like THIS one in my garage." It's thought that this method will prove less confusing, faster, and easier for all our judges and in most cases the results will be the same. Fairness will be maintained and the process should be less mysterious. Remember, it's not required that judges be ARC members so let's invite friends and family to join us, have some fun, and support the club in this important event.


