This couple has done so much for the club it would take a book to tell it all. I hope I can cover just some of the wonderful things Tom and Suzanne and the Jones/Chaney family have done to make ARC a true success story.

When I was trying to start ARC as a club back in 2011, Suzanne and her father John Chaney were right beside me, encouraging me and helping to make the organization a recognized club in SCW. John Chaney was first to step up and say "What can I do to help?" Suzanne was always by his side, and helped me with the paperwork and organizational structure. Suzanne went to numerous meetings with me to talk to the SCW management to work out an agreement. We were told that there was a moratorium on new clubs. All spaces for club meetings were completely full, so we met at Beardsley Park on picnic tables.

Mike Whiting, the SCW General Manager, was great to work with. After several promising opportunities did not pan out, he agreed to provide the land if ARC agreed to pay for the building. ARC got approved for club status, but had nowhere to meet. We started a fundraising campaign, and while I was back in St. Louis for the summer, I got a call from Tom and Suzanne. The Chaney family would donate \$100K for the building project! This was the start ARC needed. Several others stepped up and the building project was on its way. Tom had recently retired and became very much involved. The Chaney's and Jones's have not stopped. After my term as President, Tom stepped up into the role. The bylaws limited a term to two years. Tom has served every other term since ARC's conception.

Suzanne has been the RIGHT ARM for every President. She has carried the administrative load for the last thirteen years!!! I asked her to run for President once but she turned it down. In truth, Suzanne has been the glue that has held us together for so many years! Tom and Suzanne, we owe our success to you!

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Downshifting Ray Helt (#565) by Ed Zacko

Ray Helt grew up in a farming town in eastern Washington state. As always in small towns, the local hangout was the local gas station and Ray, like many of his friends, worked there part-time. In the summers, he worked on the wheat ranches to make enough money for the coming school year and, of course, buy gas! "It seems like we all had old cars. My first one was a yellow '56 Plymouth Belvedere. That car was a real lemon."

Ray somehow talked a local Chevy dealer into taking that Plymouth in trade, and ordered a brand new 1965 Chevy Impala SS two-door coupe. "It was maroon with a white interior, small block with a four-speed. Wow! What a beauty." Ray met his soon-to-be wife, Kathy Birr, while in high school and in 1963 they married.

Ray's introduction to the Corvette world was, in itself, quite the adventure. "I was just 27 years old, and saw an ad in a local newspaper for a '67 Corvette. I immediately called and ran right over to see it. The owner was not at home but his wife led me to an unlighted garage and showed me the car, all covered with dust. I gave her \$100 and told her I would be back tomorrow to give her the balance. When I arrived the next day, the owners were not home. As I stood on the front porch in a state of shock, I saw a red Corvette coming down the street. WOW! They had taken it out for cleaning and a car wash. As we filled out the papers, another guy arrived and said he had called the night before and offered to buy the car. I was crushed but the owners said that he had not put down a deposit and since I had given his wife \$100 yesterday, before he called, then I was entitled to the car. The owner's wife took me inside to complete the transaction while the two men remained on the porch locked in a heated argument. She gave me the keys and I drove away as fast as I could and never looked back!"

Ray still had that Impala SS well into the mid '70's, when their family now included two boys, Dale and Dean. "We all fit into the Impala well enough but, as much as I loved that car, I sold it to pay for a babysitter!"

In 1982 Kathy and Ray formed their own company, H&N Sales, serving as factory representatives for "electrical building materials for construction and utilities." H&N was headquartered in Seattle and eventually grew to include franchises in Idaho, Oregon, Montana and Alaska. "We began by representing only one manufacturer and eventually grew the company to seventeen employees, whose sales and marketing expertise represented twenty companies producing \$15,000,000 in annual sales."

Ray finally sold the red '67 Corvette, replacing it with a yellow '73, then a maroon '78 until finally, "As our business grew I said goodbye to the '78 and purchased a brand new C5, 2004 Coupe in bright yellow. Although I made some minor changes along the way, it was time to drive! The car odometer now reads 77,000 miles, 50,000 of which were multi-day trips with our Washington State Corvette Club."

Sadly in 2010, Kathy and Ray lost their youngest son to colon cancer and shortly after sold the business. Through the years, the Helt family had been vacationing regularly in Palm Springs but by 2012, deciding "California is just not for us," they moved to Sun City West full-time.

Kathy and Ray have been married for 60 years and their family has grown to include eight grandchildren, most of whom live in Washington state. Ray has seen many cars and trucks come and go but, "Kathy and I still have that 2004 Corvette that I bought new. One of my fondest memories is being center stage at the Las Vegas Corvette Show receiving the "People's Choice Award," out of 200 cars in the show. To date, ""EMTNEST" has won over 100 awards in nineteen years of showing the car.

Today, Ray serves on ARC's Board of Directors as Treasurer, Accounts Payable. "I'm the guy that spends our money. I enjoy meeting the many members we have in ARC and still, with over 700 members, not a day goes by that I don't say hi to some member that I have not seen before!"



AN AUTOMOBILE WORTHY OF ITS NAME By Dan Kuhl

Recently, Bob Pratt made available to the Automotive/Restoration Club membership his collection of automotive books. Of course, the author is always looking for new material for his library. The author waited until everyone had a chance at some of the books and then he made his move. To his surprise, on the table was a "nugget", an autobiography by Eddie V. Rickenbacker.

If you are not familiar with the name, he was the greatest American WWI fighter pilot with 26 victories, compared to the Red Baron, who had 80 victories. (However, the Red Baron started flying for Germany three years before Eddie.)

Following the war, Eddie continued to race cars as he did before the war, at the Indianapolis 500 and other venues around the country. He soon realized that racing wasn't what he wanted to do with his life so he went to New Mexico to visit a friend. There, he purchased a Flivver and camping gear, and embarked on a soul-searching camping trip. It was during this trip he decided to build the perfect automobile, the "Rickenbacker." He further decided from his racing experience, the Rickenbacker should have a high-speed engine, a low center of gravity, and most importantly, four-wheel brakes. But he realized he did not have the funds nor the expertise to take on such an endeavor. What to do?

Eddie decided to go to Detroit, the automobile capitol, and secure the necessary help. There he contacted Harry Cunningham, an old racing buddy who had ties with the successful EMF automobile company. From EMF he secured the assistance of Barney Everett and Walter Flanders, the man who designed the assembly line for Ford. It is important to note that EMF was purchased by Studebaker in 1910, making the founders of EMF available for other activities.

After selling some initial stocks to raise seed money, work began on the Rickenbacker automobile in 1920. By 1922, the company was ready to display the car at the New York Auto Show, complete with four-wheel brakes. The first Rickenbacker was available for sale in 1923.

Other automobile companies went on the warpath. Studebaker began running full-page newspaper ads disparaging four-wheel brakes, while dealers across the country bad-mouthed the new competition.

In 1927 after more than 27,000 cars had been manufactured, Rickenbacker filed for bankruptcy. Eddie moved back to the track, buying "the Brickyard" which he owned until 1945. But, the real story is four-wheel brakes on American automobiles.

In 1923 only two manufacturers used four-wheel brakes. The Duesenberg introduced hydraulic in 1920, and the Rickenbacker debuted mechanical in 1922. The nemesis of the Rickenbaker, Studebaker, did not get four-wheel mechanical brakes until 1931 and hydraulic in 1935.

In the early Twenties, the author believes, the public was pretty naive to the importance of brakes, because Ford had its best sales year in 1923 without four-wheel brakes. Ford did not get mechanical four-wheel brakes until 1927 and hydraulic in 1940. Chevy followed suit, introducing four-wheel mechanical brakes in 1928 and hydraulic in 1936. On the other hand, Chrysler was proactive introducing hydraulic brakes in 1924. Finally, the first disc brakes came out on the Crosley in 1949.

Eddie V. Rickenbacker was a visionary. He realized that what he had learned on the race track driving a Duesenberg race car would be important to driving safely on the public roadways of America.

In closing, the author would like the reader to visit YouTube to see Eddie's most incredible creation, the Rickenbacker Eight Super Sport Sedan. His creation has fenders that turn with the front wheels, an Auburn boat-tail, and an angled windshield, and lacks running boards. Between fourteen and seventeen were manufactured, and only one remains. This Super Sport spent a great deal of time in the Harrah's Reno collection before that was dissolved, and it was once on display at Pebble Beach. It currently resides in a private collection that can only be accessed by appointment.




