

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Downshifting Susie (#1759) and Paul (#1646) Hemler by Ed Zacko

Paul Hemler, a native of Pennsylvania, has been interested in cars since elementary school. He and "the guys" worked on their respective cars on weekends all through high school, until college got in the way. His first car was a 1969 MG Midget. "The logo on the car had lost the "M" and the "t" so it was really an "Idge," at least that's what I called it."

His fondest memory of IDGE is, "popping the cork off a champagne bottle while driving the IDGE with the top down on an empty mountain road. Ahh, the good old days along with youth and stupidity." "I stalled the IDGE in heavy traffic on the Betsy Ross bridge in Philadelphia one Sunday afternoon while returning from the Jersey shore. The alternator bracket had broken on the trip and the battery had drained, preventing me from restarting the car. A police car quickly was on the scene and pushed me so I could kick start the car. That happened in 1979, I can only imagine how horrible it would be if something like that happened today.

Paul kept that car all through college but living in an apartment made owning a British car a challenge. He eventually sold "IDGE" and replaced it with a more reliable Japanese car.

Upon graduation, Paul accepted a job at Bell Labs in Allentown, PA and while there, met his future bride, Susie, who came by way of Massachusetts, New York, Arizona, and Virginia. Susie was not interested in hot cars but was interested in "the guys who had the hot cars." At that time, she was driving a new 1980 SAAB Turbo. "That SAAB was a blast to drive and really lessened the pain of parting with IDGE."

Susie and Paul married in 1984. He eventually left Bell Labs and they moved to Raleigh, NC. Paul went to work as a college professor teaching Engineering and Computer Science, while Susie pursued a career in Integrated Circuit Design, eventually moving on to high tech sales. Their respective jobs had them "on the move" from Boston to California, and back to North Carolina.

In 2008, Susie retired from high tech, obtained her paralegal certificate, and worked for a year and a half as a development manager for the SPCA. In 2010 she attained her teaching certificate and went to work teaching high school math. Their family had now grown to include daughters, Rachel and MB, and a 1993 Mazda Miata, which they kept until the two girls could no longer "double buckle" in the passenger seat. This gave rise to a 2002 BMW 330 CIC with a removable hard top, and a Triumph TR6.

In 2012, the Hemlers found themselves in Colorado Springs when Paul accepted a teaching position at the US Air Force Academy. When Paul said goodbye to the Air Force in 2021, they all, cars included, relocated to Virginia where big changes were in the works. The garage was simply too small! Susie now insisted that her car needed its own space in the garage. The BMW went first and the TR6 followed close behind, because Paul had finally found his dream car: a burgundy, 1970 Jaguar E-Type (XKE to we Americans) and "owning two British sports cars was more than enough!"

Susie discovered Sun City West on the web and when they discovered ARC, they were sold. They came first as renters in 2021, becoming homeowners and snowbirds in 2022.

What could be better, spending the summer days sailing on Smith Mountain Lake, Virginia and eventing with your best gal tooling the around the same lake under the stars with your Jaguar XKE? The summers in Virginia were grand but the winters in AZ lacked something——the Jaguar, of course!

Paul is a regular monitor at ARC, and helps out selling tickets for our raffle cars and the golf tournament. Susie has resurrected her computer tech skills and now serves as the official ARC bookkeeper. In February, Susie and Paul took the plunge and had their beloved E-Type Jaguar shipped to Sun City West. Now, they have it all!

My Mecum experience began back in August 2018 when I attended the Mecum auction in Monterey, CA. I took one of our ARC hats to give to Dana Mecum. I told Dana about our club and he was very interested. He invited me backstage to meet his General Manager, Harold Gerdis. They told me about plans to hold an event in Phoenix and asked if our club would be interested in driving auction cars. I said I would be interested and would ask the President of the club to propose it to the members. I suggested they hold the event in the west valley since most other events are around Scottsdale.

Harold called me back over the Thanksgiving week of 2018 and asked me if I could recruit 120 drivers. Tom Jones, who was President at that time, helped me get 90 drivers from ARC and 30 from Vintage Vehicles of Sun City.

Fast forward to the 2024 car show in Sun City West. One of Mecum's consignment agents, Brett Baugh, was at our show and approached me in the "Car Corral". Brett wanted to know more details about the 1965 GTO I was selling. After we had talked for a while, he asked if I had ever considered listing my car in the Glendale auction coming up in March.

Brett offered to waive the listing fee of \$1000 for my car, gave me his business card, and said to call. Brett signed me up for Thursday, March 7 at 4 p.m. I set my reserve at \$80,000 and my GTO went on the block. The bid went to \$65,000 quickly and stopped! It then went to "The Bid Goes On". I had no knowledge of how "TBGO" worked so I figured the sale was over for me. It rained hard several times on the 7th so the next day I went down and brought my car home to dry it out.

I returned to the show on Saturday the 9th to hang out with friends. I got a call from Dave Purvis, Consignment Director at Mecum at about 2 p.m. He told me they had a bid of \$79,200, and asked if I would take it. I told him yes. Dave knew I took my car home, so he said he would call me back in two minutes to clarify a firm bid. He called me and said "Bring it back, it's sold!" The Bid Goes On works!

I was one of at least five ARC members who listed their cars, and several of them sold. The entire experience was great. I felt no pressure to sell and every Mecum employee had a smile on their face.



Mecum Auctions had their annual event at the StateFarm Stadium in Glendale from March 5 to March 9. Approximately twelve ARC members worked as drivers and shuttle for the event. Mecum offered ARC members a deal to waive the entrance fee to sell a car at the auction. Four members were successful in selling their vehicles. A fun and busy week was had by all who worked at the event. Another year in the books for Mecum and the ARC members.



Mileage Tax

The following was sent to ARC members from Al Tracy of the Hobbyist Council.

The Arizona Automobile Hobbyist Council asks for the help of all car enthusiasts in getting passed AZ Senate bill SB 1010, which would ban any mileage tax. Currently, many states like CA are considering a per mile tax. In AZ we already pay both State and Federal gas taxes, and we currently pay the third highest car registration fees in the country. (A board member grew up in Ohio, and currently their registration fees are a maximum of \$30 per year).

SB 1010 is stuck in Committee. We need help getting it out of Committee and brought to a vote in the Senate and then the House of Representatives.

The AAHC was successful in getting our "No Toll Roads" law into effect on January 1 of this year. It took us ten years to actually get the bill before the Legislature. We cannot wait that long to keep a per mile tax out of here.

We are asking that all concerned citizens e-mail or call their legislators in the Senate and the House of Representatives. Let them know that we are concerned about the "Tax and Spend" effort that is sweeping the country.

The color, Ice Blue Metallic, was only offered in 2004 and only around 100 were ordered with the Sand Interior Package, so the color combination is rather rare. It comes with all the normal options along with a power soft top and the optional hard top with the factory storage rack. This also will reduce the liability we undertake every time we jump behind the wheel.



Old Cars in Cuba, March 2024 by James McLinn ARC

Old cars somehow always bring out the joy and fond memories in many of us. We might call ourselves car fans or motor heads, yet old cars often represent the "good old days" we experienced as youths. Perhaps these cars evoke a memory of good family life, our good times or even memories of an adventure in our youth. That may be why many flock to the ARC as it represents our youth with adventures in cars. The Cubans have similar fond memories of these old cars and have actually preserved many old vehicles. Some are in better condition than when new. Cubans added to old cars as they preserved these classic vehicles.

In Havana and throughout Cuba they have preserved a large number of vehicles from the 1930s through 1959. Stop in Havana next to their central park and look at the row of classic cars. They have the old forms, but carry new interiors, classic and flashy paint jobs and new lights and modern engines. Gone are the flathead motors of the 1950s. These are replaced by overhead valve straight sixes and V8 motors. They still have the same sounds from the past and most still are powered by leaded gasoline. Cruise along the Malecon, an eight-mile strip along the ocean that runs from central Havana west to Hemingway Harbor. Walk along the Prado or through the Parque Central and you are surrounded by the 1950s. Big-bodied vehicles drive the narrow streets with tourists in the back seats of many convertibles. It is always sunny in Havana, with the whiff of gasoline in the air. Colors on the cars exist that never were imagined by Ford or Chevy. Glowing bright coral, bright canary yellow, eye popping purple and day glow orange can all be seen.

Watch as the vehicles go by. There is a 1952 Chevy convertible with white leather interior. Next comes a bright red and white 1957 Ford Fairlane followed by a 1958 Chrysler Imperial with gigantic tail fins and huge tail lights. Drivers and passengers wear Panama hats and some sport fine Cuban cigars. Such a show will surely shake out the lethargy in any retired person. A parade of twelve or more vehicles may be often seen in downtown Havana. A 1949 Olds may be followed by a 1956 T-bird convertible; next comes a 1954 Buick Roadmaster sporting the classic chrome exhaust holes just behind the tires. These might be followed by a 1949 Plymouth sedan and then a 1952 Mercury convertible in bright orange. Next might be a 1955 Cadillac trailed by a 1957 Studebaker Golden Hawk and a 1957 Oldsmobile Super 88. After that comes a 1953 Willys Wagon accompanied by a 1958 Edsel convertible in bright red and white.

Step up to the lineup of classics on the Prado in front of the National Ballet. Negotiate a little with the driver and hop in for a ride you haven't experienced since your youth. The drivers know their cars. The engine purrs while the wind ruffles your hair as you go by classic stone buildings. Young men and women dressed in bright clothes walk along the boulevard with a swing in their step. If it is Sunday you will see families stroll by while horse-drawn carriages ferry tourists in front of the gold-domed Cuban Capitol building, resplendent since it is a copy of the US Capitol. Hudsons with plenty of chrome cruise next to a silver 1960 Corvair and a bright green 1963 Jaguar sedan. This mix now includes many foreign cars of newer times. An old 1970s VW bug may sit next to a 1980s Lada, while a 1990s Hyundai and a 2010 Toyota Land Cruiser park next to a 2018 Mercedes.

Pop the hood on any 1950s car and you may see a new V6 engine combined with an old alternator. Occasional generators still exist and operate in the 1950 bodies. A few may be tricked out with LED headlights, modern side mirrors with LED, or ground effects lights. All tourists are greeted warmly, especially US tourists since they have been scarce during the last four years. While the classic cars remain, the times are changing in Cuba.

Americans are now welcome again and people on the street will express warm feelings towards the US. I heard such sentiments every day I was there. Many Cubans have relatives in Florida, Chicago, Tampa and other cities in California, New York, and Kentucky as these were all mentioned to me. New life is in the air. Cubans are determined to move forward and talk with envy of the US. The travel door is now open for US citizens as it has been for many years prior for Canadians, Italians, Germans and French, all of whom I met on my travels in Cuba. Problems exist there as the legacy of the prior 70 years. Old buildings in decay sit next to modern construction. Electrical power can be a problem outside of Havana, because it is generated with oil.

I have prepared a slide show of cars I saw in Cuba. It will be installed on the computer near the monitors' desk. Have a look at it. Meanwhile, look at the two photos below showing a few cars.


